# What's Changing?

When you nominate for an award, there will be many new changes we hope you'll enjoy! You will notice that the applications are now all digital and are supported through the awards platform, Submittable. This new platform will now give you as a nominator the:

- Ability to nominate an individual without completing the entire application;
- Ability to collaborate with your nominee(s) on the application (optional);
- A streamlined application form(s); and
- The timeline of activities for nominees and state affiliates.

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We have also made some changes to make the awards more inclusive and accessible, so with that we are excited to announce we:

- Allow self-nominations.
- Will use an ad-hoc committee of volunteers for regional judging.
- Removed certificate requirement for the Employee of the Year (EOY) and Manager of the Year (MOY) Awards, and will Use points in the scoring rubric to give the nominee credit for having the certificate.
- Removed requirements for a certificate or credential and service on state or national committee or board for the Director of the Year (DOY) Award, and use points in the scoring rubric to give the nominee credit for having these qualifications.
- Shortened the membership requirement to three (3) years for the DOY Award.

# Juneau School District Food Service Program – Application-Blitz Week

In an effort to get the word out that Juneau School District students can eat for free this year, the food service program sent out a survey asking for feedback. This survey was sent to all district families and had an added bonus at the end of it – the parent could enter to

win \$100 worth of groceries. The district got over 400 responses! This was the first time the program has gotten so many responses. A winner was drawn randomly, and Adrianne Schwartz and Catherine Pusich delivered groceries to the family. The Juneau School District has seen a lower number of families applying for meal benefits this year. Flyers were mailed and emailed to all families who had expired benefits which announced an "Application Blitz Week" for the week of October 25-29. Applicants that were approved during this week were entered to win a Thanksgiving food basket. The program extended benefits to 41 households that week. The food was delivered on November 22 to the winning family.

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# More Than Just Lunch

One in seven, or 11 million, children in America live in households without consistent access to adequate food. Every Monday morning, school nutrition professionals witness this hunger on the faces of students eagerly waiting in line for a school breakfast after a long weekend without enough to eat.

Armed with scientific research linking school meals and healthy diets to academic success, school nutrition professionals have worked to expand breakfast programs, launch summer and afterschool meal programs to meet students' nutritional needs.

## Expanding the School Breakfast Program:

On average, students who eat school breakfast have been shown to achieve 17.5% higher scores on standardized math tests and attend 1.5 more days of school per year (<u>No Kid Hungry</u>). Unfortunately, tight school bus timetables, late student arrivals and early class schedules can limit participation in traditional cafeteria breakfast programs.

Fortunately, school nutrition professionals are finding creative ways to overcome these barriers. School breakfast participation is increasing through innovative delivery methods, such as grab-and-go service options, which allow students to quickly pick up their meal from the cafeteria or a hallway kiosk on their way to class. Many schools are even serving breakfast in the classroom so students can enjoy a healthy meal during morning announcements.

## **Summer Meals:**

Every child deserves a carefree summer vacation, but for many kids, summer break means an end to the free and reduced-price school meals they depend on during the school year. Thankfully, in many communities across the nation, school nutrition programs are stepping up to make sure children don't go hungry this summer.

Through the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) <u>Summer Food Service Program</u>, schools serving lowincome communities can provide free meals and snacks to children at school cafeterias, parks, playgrounds, public housing complexes, summer camps or churches.

## Afterschool Snacks and Meals:

Through NSLP, nearly 23,000 schools and institutions serve healthy snacks to children participating in afterschool activities. Click on the links for <u>more information on afterschool snacks</u>, including a <u>fact</u> <u>sheet</u> detailing reimbursement rates, eligibility and menu requirements. Under the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP), eligible sites serve a snack or a meal to children as part of afterschool activities. Visit USDA's <u>CACFP page</u> for more information.

## Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program:

The <u>Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program</u> provides free fresh fruit and vegetable snacks to students during the school day in elementary schools with high free and reduced-price eligibility rates. Participating schools receive between \$50 to \$75 per student each year.
